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Our Historians have been verv lucky this term as we've had 2 very special visitors in to talk to us. Bringing history to life and making it "real" is a particular focus of our department and we can't think of a better way of doing this than meeting people who have been through some of the most incredible, or horrific, experiences in history. We have been looking in depth at some of the key turning points in our world in the 20th Century and with year 9 we've been studying 9/11. The students have been brilliant offering some really insightful thoughts as well as provoking some interesting debates. To conclude this in depth study we were lucky enough to be visited by a survivor of 9/11 who's story, whilst harrowing, really topped off the students experience of this to herself, so as to not lose her; as event.

Christine was staying in a hotel directly in front of the Trade Centre Towers and recalled the shaking of the building and the chaos of everyone trying to flee the cen-

tre of New York. Her story was almost one of tragedy but thankfully for her and her family turned out well in the end. One of the most fascinating stories from Christine was where a massive bolt had flown through the air and lodged itself in her daughter's back pack, which but for that strap, things could have been much more tragic. The students were also able to see pictures that Christine had brought with her and incredibly, a



piece of string that she had picked up that she had tied her daughter well as a napkin she took from the hotel breakfast area which proved vital in covering her mouth from all of the dust from the falling buildings. All of this, I believe, helped bring this story to life for our students.



As well as this, we have been involved in an absolutely incredible project working with other schools to raise awareness about Genocide. Hampton School for Boys had thought it was a massive problem that awareness of Genocide was so limited (we agree!) and so set upon a mission to raise awareness of it. The project has taken off and has led to meetings with key politicians and a real presence on the internet. This project will culminate in the production of a book written by the Hampton Boys, but will also include work from our students here at St. Clements. This will range from poetry, diaries, or just reflections on what has been a difficult topic to learn about, in the sense of the horror of the Rwandan Genocide.

We have been looking in detail at the Rwandan Genocide of 1994 and were incredibly fortunate to have a survivor with an amazing story to come and talk to us.

Illuminee suffered great personal tragedy during the Genocide but survived with some real courage. Illuminee escaped Rwanda with her new born son Roger who has grown up in Norwich and is an aspiring rapper and actor. Overall, we have been very privileged with her visit and pleased with the raising of awareness of the most horrible of events in Rwanda's history.

The students commented after Illuminee's visit on how life changing this was hearing how she used all of her will power and courage to survive, "It made me realise that I can do what I want". I think for me, the most powerful message to come out of this visit was that we can all make a difference and stop hate and bullying at all levels by simply standing up and doing the right thing. I'd like to finish this piece by reflecting on another point Illuminee made, "No one will ever come and do things for you [just give your dreams to you], you have to want it, and do it for yourself!" – If we can't be inspired by Illuminee and her story, then nothing will!

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Year 8 were asked to create a presentation about their choice of a real volcanic, earthquake or tsunami event.


The project was presented on a hat so that pupils could wear it and take pride in their findings.


A cracking effort was made by Year 8 and they expressed a genuine sense of fun and enjoyment in their learning of these natural events.


We clearly did not disgrace ourselves as there were a few close rounds!!!

When you get your book token, all you need to do is to take it to your local bookshop and swap it for one of these (exclusive, new and completely free) £1 World Book Day books!





Or, if you'd prefer, you can use your book token to get £1 off any full price book instead! And if you'd rather get an audio book, that's fine too!
